

Winter-Summer People Suite by George Allen

—— Concert review by Jesse C. McCarroll –



n Sunday, September 5, 2010, I attended the 20th Anniversary Celebration of the Tony Williams Scholarship Jazz Festival to hear a performing group of Dr. George Allen, a jazz performer, composer and scholar. To my surprise, the performance group was a symphony orchestra and not a traditional jazz band. The orchestra, located on the floor in front of the stage in the ballroom, was comprised of approximately thirty musicians that included a woodwind quartet, a trombone and a tuba as well as a string section. The percussion section consisted of a wonderful steel

drum (pan) player, Mark Johnson and an assortment of percussive instruments. Vincent Rutland was on the trap set and Craig McIver played the marimba and tympani. The marimba sound along with that of the steel drum added an interesting and different texture to the symphony orchestra.

Two extremely talented pianists, Dr. Jay Fluellen, a composer and Fared Barron, who played with Wynton Marsalis in Jazz at Lincoln Center, alternated playing the one grand piano located on the small stage. Also seated on the stage was a choir consisting of approximately fifteen singers. The lyrics of the composition were based on a poem by Nneka Ford, one of Allen's former students.

The program began with one of Dr Allen's former students, Kathy Thomas, playing her own violin solo arrangement of "Misty." As she finished the solo, the symphony orchestra began to play and the music moved to an even higher level.

Following the violin solo, Dr. Allen introduced his original composition, "Winter-Summer People Suite." He explained the approximately forty-five minute composition was an autobiographical sketch of his former students at Overbrook High School in Philadelphia, PA, some of whom participated in the performance. Dr. Allen also indicated there were students who were neither winter nor summer. These students were described by music played on the tuba by a former student, Dante Ford, now enrolled at Penn State University.

Dr. Allen showed great sensitivity in conducting the symphony orchestra as it played the eclectic composition. The final movement incorporated "Ceora," which was composed by Lee Morgan, a Philadelphia trumpet player. This movement featured an excellent tenor saxophone soloist, Tommy Grice. The audience expressed great approval of his performance as well as that of the symphony orchestra.

This composition needs to be performed many times for large audiences. I was very happy to hear that it will be performed at our NASPAAM conference in Houston.




NASPAAM Launches Scholarships to College Student Composers

It is required that original compositions are written for solo voice, instrumental or piano and must be reflective of African-American traditional styles in music. All compositions must be submitted by January 15, 2011. The winning scholarship recipient will be required to attend the NASPAAM Conference in Houston to accept the award. Further, it is anticipated the winning composition will be performed at the Awards Banquet, March 25, 2011.
